Our seminar with Dr. Srinivas began with a live demo of the first trimester scan, showcasing systematic evaluation for early anomalies. This was followed by a case-based discussion on structural abnormalities identified between 11– 14 weeks. The next session covered screening for PIH and FGR, highlighting the role of uterine artery Doppler and preventive strategies. The final session focused on aneuploidy screening, emphasizing combined testing and NIPT for early chromosomal risk assessment.

Seminar Recap: First Trimester Screening – A Comprehensive Approach

Speaker: Dr. Srinivas

Our recent seminar delivered by Dr. Srinivas offered a holistic view of first trimester prenatal screening, combining practical insights with evidence-based discussions. The seminar was divided into focused sessions that engaged participants in both theory and hands-on learning.

Session 1: Live Demonstration – First Trimester Scan

The event began with a live demonstration of the 11–14 week scan, where Dr. Srinivas walked the audience through key anatomical checkpoints. Participants observed real-time techniques for evaluating nuchal translucency (NT), nasal bone, and early detection of major anomalies such as acrania, cystic hygroma, and limb defects. This session emphasized the importance of meticulous technique and proper timing for optimal scan quality.

Session 2: Case-Based Discussion – First Trimester Anomalies

This interactive session involved a series of case studies showcasing rare and common anomalies detected in the first trimester. Dr. Srinivas discussed the diagnostic clues, prognostic implications, and management pathways for each case, highlighting the value of early structural assessment in clinical decision-making and patient counseling.

Session 3: Screening for PIH and FGR

The focus then shifted to screening for pregnancy-induced hypertension (PIH) and fetal growth restriction (FGR). Dr. Srinivas elaborated on the role of uterine artery Doppler, maternal risk factor assessment, and biomarkers in early prediction. The session stressed the importance of timely intervention, including low-dose aspirin administration to reduce the risk of placental insufficiency.

Session 4: Aneuploidy Screening in the First Trimester

In the final session, Dr. Srinivas addressed aneuploidy screening, comparing methods such as the combined test (NT, PAPP-A, free β -hCG) and non-invasive prenatal testing (NIPT). The discussion underscored the high sensitivity of these tools in detecting Trisomy 21, 18, and 13, and emphasized personalized counseling based on individual risk assessment.

Conclusion

The seminar provided an in-depth look at the power of early screening, blending technology, clinical expertise, and patientcentered care. Dr. Srinivas's sessions were both informative and inspiring, equipping attendees with practical tools to enhance prenatal diagnosis and outcomes.
